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ORIENTATION

The Amalfi Coast spans the Bay of Naples and the Bay of Salerno, though the sweet spot is the stretch between Sorrento and Ravello. Positano lies in the middle and is where we start this trip.

You'll likely arrive in Naples by plane or by train. From here, you can get picked up by a driver or rent a car for the hour-plus drive around the coast. Sorrento is a main point of entry, either by ferry from Naples or Capri or on the scenic and long local train. You'll want to leave Sorrento, because everything gets better farther down the coast.

DAY ONE: RISE AND SHINE

Get into Amalfi Coast mode and make it all about the sea — lazy hours basking in the sunshine at the beach and indulging in fresh seafood, produce, and wine as you ponder the impossible beauty of your surroundings.

A Sweet Start

Around here, people are addicted to sweets and pastries — hence all the cornetti and sfogliatelle at the breakfast spread at your hotel. If you're starting your day in Positano, stop at **Casa e Bottega** for fresh fruits and jams.

You're on a Boat

Get your bearings on a sail along the coast. Your hotel can arrange a reliable captain; we trust **Capo Amalfi Coast**. You'll cruise for a few beautiful hours, from empty coves to dramatic Furore fjord. Don't waste time at Grotta dello Smeraldo, but do have the captain drop anchor when you see a spot that looks good for a dip.

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GOOD AFTERNOON

Spaghetti in the Sunshine

Bid farewell to the boat but stay close to the water: lunch on the beach. **La Tonarella** is a rustic, family-style restaurant in Conca dei Marini, a pretty little cove near Amalfi. Order pasta, fresh local fish, and a bottle of a crisp fiano or falanghina.

Closer to Positano in Laurito is **Da Adolfo**, a lively (and very popular) restaurant only accessible by boat. The house specials are grilled mozzarella in lemon leaf and zuppa di cozze (yummy mussels). A boat service shuttles guests back and forth to Positano.

It's Spritz O'Clock

Positano is *very* touristy. Which means you may have to wait (or hustle) for your al fresco perch at **Franco's Bar**, which (be warned) doesn't take reservations. Your reward: epic views, primo cocktails.

DAY TWO: RISE AND SHINE

Stick to the **Sorrentine Peninsula**, the part of the coast most tourists forget, for a little nature, a little history, and two unforgettable meals.

Morning Hike

Get a ride or drive to Nerano and follow the small hand-written signs for **leranto**, a protected nature reserve. This walk can last from one to four hours, depending how far you want to go. To the right is one of many crumbling Saracen towers that dot the coastline. To the left is the beautiful and quiet bay (no boats allowed) and the former quarry works. Don't forget to bring water (buy it at the bottega in Nerano) and sunscreen.

Reward Your Feet

You'll spend the afternoon downhill in Marina del Cantone. Stop at **La Piccola Positano** in the small piazza and order a pair of custommade leather sandals. Have lunch, and the shoes will be ready by the end of your meal.

Farm to Table to Heaven

Tommaso is perched on the sea and attracts a well-heeled but mellow crowd. Come hungry: This is Italian grandma cooking at its finest, with a menu spotlighting produce from their farms around the peninsula and seafood from the nearby waters. The food is so incredible, you'll want to come back again tomorrow and tomorrow and tomorrow.

Table for Two

Don Alfonso 1890, the finest fine dining restaurant on the Amalfi Coast, underwent a radical transformation to become one of the most ecological culinary destinations in the world (zero emissions, zero waste). Beautifully composed dishes either innovate or revisit classics. Order the tasting menu and a wine pairing — owner Livia laccarino will probably drop by the table to make sure you're having the meal of a lifetime. After dinner, ask to tour the wine cellar built into an Etruscan passageway to the sea. It's almost too good to be true.

DAY THREE: RISE AND SHINE

Head down the coast to **Amalfi** and **Ravello**, popular but unmissable towns with great historic and artistic legacies. And, yes, more amazing views.

Morning Jolt

Amalfi, once a mighty port town, can get crowded quickly. But it's worth a visit – just stick to local spots like lovely **Bistro F.IIi Pansa**, where Amalfitani sit in the sunshine and have too many espressos and pastries.

Walk back to the water to the wonderful waterfront restaurant **Lido Azzurro**. More pasta, more fresh seafood, more white wine. Are you sick of it yet? Of course not!

HOTELS: REST EASY, REST HAPPY

Caruso, A Belmond Hotel

The luxury bolthole in a former 11th-century palace has frescoes, traditional décor, an unforgettable hilltop location in Ravello, and an infinity pool looking out to sea that has been photographed probably more than any other in the country.

Borgo Santandrea

Two Italian brothers spent four years restructuring an old hotel in Conca dei Marini, a mellow cove just outside Amalfi. The structure tumbles graciously down a cliff — the entrance is at street level; the rest of the hotel is terraced down to the sea, where Borgo has a private beach, beach club, and dock. The decor mixes mid-century (original Gio Ponti) and classic Amalfi (the ceramic tiles include 31 floor patterns).

Casa Angelina

A chic and discreet hotel with 39 rooms in a quiet location on the coast right outside Praiano. Everything is crisp and white — the structure, the furnishings, the billowing curtains — except for the artwork and sculptures.

Don Alfonso 1890

An intimate boutique hotel and Michelin restaurant in the hilltop town Sant' Agata Sui Due Golfi. The handful of rooms named for herbs are decorated in bright and beautiful ceramics and textiles. Of special note is the Casa del Poeta, a two-story, single room hideaway near the pool decorated with the laccarino family's own furniture from the 1700s and 1800s.

Hotel Lo Scoglio

The third-generation family restaurant has a handful of very simple, spotless (like, Italian nonna spotless) rooms upstairs. The hotel isn't right for anyone who wants extensive services, but it's a divine choice if your idea of heaven is a large terrace on the Mediterranean in a low-maintenance and totally unplugged hideaway.

Once through the hotel entrance along the main road before Amalfi, you'll feel transported. The food excels at gourmet Glicine and seaside Al Mare, the rooms are decorated in traditional charm, and the Beach Club is for guests only. In other words: old-world luxury at its finest.

Easily the chicest and coolest address on the Amalfi Coast for the art, the fashion, and the Sersale family's hospitality. It's a beloved refuge — and easily the best thing in touristy Positano.

The best thing about Sorrento may be this charming boutique hotel built onto a hill and impeccably decorated with colorful ceramics and objects in a nautical theme by the designer behind some of the coast's best spots.

Villa Treville

A collection of four villas right outside Positano in the former home of Italian director Franco Zeffirelli. The setting is dramatic: lush gardens and an elevator that cuts through the cliffs down to the sea. Suites are named for former guests and operas (Nijinsky, Callas, Aida) and are decorated in whites with bright tiles and accents. The Moroccan-style bar is ideal for nightcaps.

BONUS ESCAPES

If you want to add more time to your Amalfi
Coast vacation — and, truly, you'll always want
to add more time — here are a few excellent
destinations to round out your trip.

The Glorious Ruins

As hard as it will be to tear yourself away from the sea and the sun, the ruins of **Pompeii** and neighboring **Herculaneum** are a wonder to behold and make for an easy day trip. The Italians aren't doing the best job of preserving these treasures, but not even that can get in the way of the experience. Take a taxi or the local train La Circumvesuviana, which stops at the ruins. For the best experience, hire **Silvia Braggio** and her team of excellent guides.

For more history, head south to **Paestum** for the impressive ruins of the ancient Greek city and to visit a local mozzarella di bufula farm like Barlotti (lunch and water buffalos!). Definitely work with Silvia to arrange this.

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Naples

Many of the best Pompeii ruins are on display at the Naples National Archaeological Museum. Naples itself may be a former beauty that's gone to seed (hey, the truth hurts), but the city is still so very captivating. For a quickie afternoon tour, take in Spaccanapoli, Sansevero Chapel to see *The Veiled Christ* sculpture, the garden cloisters at Santa Chiara, and the Bourbon spoils at Palazzo Reale.

Break to taste the famous Neapolitan pizza at Concettina ai Tre Santi or Sorbillo — the families have been slinging pies for generations — or head to Mimì alla Ferrovia for traditional Neapolitan cooking. When the meal is great, they say it's "tutt'appost!" Finally, stop for a coffee at Caffe Gambrinus in Piazza del Plebiscito, close to the port where ferries leave for Sorrento and Capri. If you want to spend the night, the art-filled B&B Atelier Inès wins for charm and local color.



Ischia

The islands in the Bay of Naples make for nice two- or three-day additions to an Amalfi Coast getaway. Ischia is not nearly as well known as Capri, and is all the better for it.

There are fantastic ruins (Castello Aragonese, Villa Arbusto), beautiful gardens (Giardini La Mortella, Giardini Ravino), and thermal water parks where you can easily spend a day (Negombo, Poseidon). The hotels of choice are Terme Manzi, Mezzatorre, and Albergo il Monastero.



Capri

A proper visit means avoiding the hordes of tourists who flock here, especially the day trippers. One way to do it is by boat, sailing around the southern end of the island — posing for photos with the Faraglioni, visiting the lesser-known grottoes, stopping for lunch (as for La Fontelina, it's overpriced and overrated).

If you're staying on Capri, super chic hotel J.K. Capri is a convenient base. Walking is the most charming way to get around. After hurrying through the clogged center of town, visit the Roman ruins of Villa Jovis, stroll Via Tragara to the gardens of Certosa San Giacomo, and have a lunch on the water.

Anacapri is an easy ride away and has its own treasures, notably the house and gardens of Villa San Michele and the chairlift up Monte Solaro for a breathtaking panorama out to sea. The magnificent art-filled Capri Palace is the place to stay, not only for the spa but for its fine dining restaurant L'Olivo and for Il Riccio, its glamorous seaside beach club and restaurant.





DRIVERS & SAILORS

To Drive or Not to Drive?

For some, navigating the hairpin curves with their plunging ravines is no big deal. (It's even fun.) For others, driving the Amalfi Coast is a white-knuckled nightmare. The traffic snarls, especially in high season, are no joke, and the two-way roads mean going a short distance can be a long excursion. Whether or not you rent a car ultimately depends on how mobile you want to be. While there so much to see, you shouldn't underestimate the joy of staying put.

As for public transportation between Sorrento and Ravello, it's limited to slow local buses.

Hiring drivers may be the best bet. Your hotel will have reliable recommendations, but we rely on Fabrizio Fiorinelli of Amalfi Drive Limousine Service. He covers the coast, makes airport pickups, and speaks excellent English.

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LOCAL DELICACIES

The Campania region is flanked by sea breezes on one side and mountain airs on the other, making for an excellent growing climate for fruits and vegetables, most notably tomatoes and lemons. The seas are also especially bountiful, making fish the thing to eat. You'll recognize sea urchin (rici), anchovies (alici), and Venus clams (tartufi di mare), but don't miss regional species like pezzogna, scorfano, and cicala. Most restaurants will brag that their food is incredibly local, and that's pretty much true. In the province of Naples, desserts are beloved. Do try sweets like baba al rhum and Caprese, a divine flourless chocolate cake.



SOUVENIRS

Old-Fashioned Stationery

Amalfi has a long and storied paper-making tradition. La Scuderia del Duca is a two-room shop overflowing with stationery, paper goods, and leather-bound books at all price points. For the ultimate Amalfi look, get a fountain pen and brown ink and a personalized wax seal.

SAY IT LIKE A LOCAL
